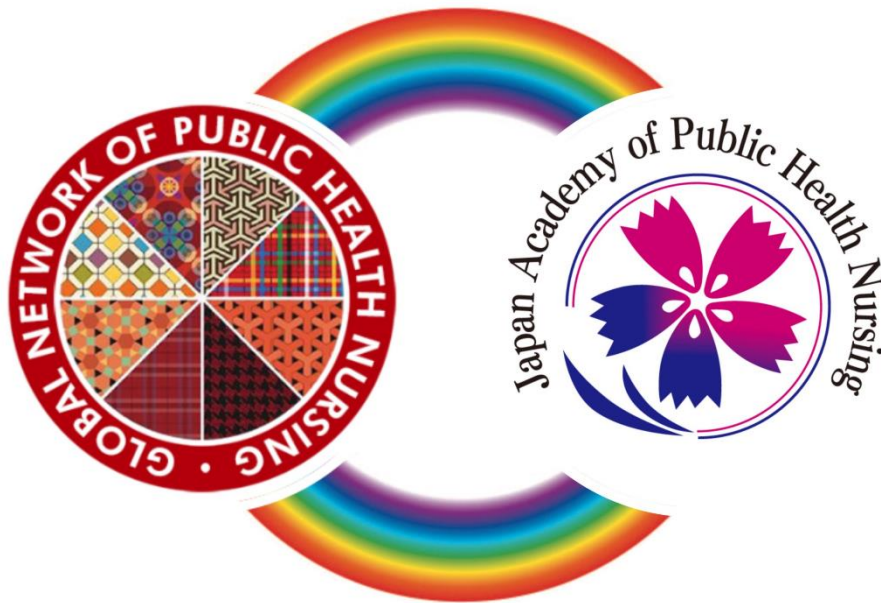

## History of GNPHN

- The first International GNPHN Conference began in 2009 in Oslo, Norway, where the creation of a global network of public health nursing was discussed.
- Prior to the third international conference held in Galway (Ireland) in 2013, five meetings were held in Durban (South Africa, ICN 2009), Minnesota (US, 2010, as the 2<sup>nd</sup> GNPHN), Malta (Malta, ICN 2011), Japan (JNA 2012), and Melbourne, Australia (ICN 2013) to discuss the need to establish a network of PHNs.
- Three of these meetings were held under the auspices of the International Council of Nurses; ICN. ICN, while recognizing the need for such a network, expressed its inability to support its establishment as an ICN.
- Therefore, it was agreed that the Institute of Community Nursing (ICHN) in Dublin (Ireland) would take the leadership in creating the necessary infrastructure for the formation of this network.
- Funded by Irish Aid, GNPHN was officially launched in Dublin by ICHN in June 2014.
- ICHN then assumed the GNPHN Secretariat. After the 4th International Conference held in Billund (Denmark, 2016), the Secretariat was transferred to the Institute of Health Visitors (IHV) in the UK in January 2017. At the 4th International Conference, the Constitution of GNPHN were approved (setting the terms of reference for holding an international conference every 2-3 years, etc.) and the Board of Directors (Council members) were also decided (previously driven by the Steering Group).
- As of 2019, GNPHN was governed by directors from 11 countries (regular web meetings were held every three months) and had membership from 29 countries ([www.gnphn.com](http://www.gnphn.com)).
- The 5th International Conference was held in Nairobi, Kenya, May 14-16, 2019.
- During the Council's web meeting in December 2018, the next conference location for 2021/2022 was discussed and the Asia/Pacific area (Japan, Australia or New Zealand) was shortlisted, and at the international conference in Kenya, the 6th conference was decided to be held in Japan.

## 1. Introduction

### 1) Theme

The theme of the 6th International Conference of Global Network of Public Health Nursing (GNPHN) jointly held with the 10th Annual Conference of Japan Academy of Public Health Nursing was decided as follows: “Stay watchful in health time! Positive health to prepare for risks, so as to protect LIFE.” The term “LIFE” in this theme implies “life,” “living,” “production,” and “right to live” according to the wisdom of our ancestors involved in public health. The core mission founding the basis of all professionals engaged in public health nursing, including public health nurses, is to protect the “life” of people. In the real world, there exist lots of both foreseeable and invisible risks and in fact, we may unexpectedly encounter a risk. That’s why we need to stay watchful in health time to predict potential risks so that we can take appropriate action to handle them once they occur. At that time, taking full advantage of the specialty of our profession, we not only focus on the negative aspect by working hard to “eliminate harmful things” but also focus our attention to the positive aspect by making things “move in positive directions.” Thanks to the specialty of our profession, we can fulfill our duties “as colleagues working in collaboration together” and “by doing so, have fun too.” The organizers of this joint conference aimed at giving all participants an opportunity to deliberate the specialty as public health nurses and help restore the public health nurses’ energy and spirits towards the future.

In December 2018, the GNPHN Council decided to hold the 6th International Conference of GNPHN (hereinafter referred to as 6th GNPHN) in the Asia/Pacific regions, in which no GNPHN conferences had been conducted, and listed up Japan, Australia, and New Zealand as candidates. When the 4th GNPHN was held in Denmark in 2016, Emeritus Professor Ros Bryar, who has been a steering member of the GNPHN since its establishment, and other members sounded the Japanese member of the GNPHN Council out on a possibility of holding the conference in Japan.

Under these circumstances, it was decided that Kiyomi Asahara, Kazuko Saeki, and Reiko Okamoto who are the directors of the Japan Academy of Public Health Nursing (JAPHN) and participated in the 4<sup>th</sup> GNPHN played a central role in exploring the possibility of conducting the 6th GNPHN in Japan.

### **3) Course of events leading to the 6th GNPHN to be held in Japan**

When the possibility of holding the 6th GNPHN in Japan was inquired, the JPAHN was about to set up a committee to plan a special event to commemorate the 10th anniversary of the JPAHN, which was established in July 2012. In addition, the JPAHN had long wanted since its establishment to hold an annual conference with a public health nurse, who is working in actual nursing settings, as a president because the presidents of annual conferences of JPAHN had been educational researchers at universities with the vice presidents, heads of public health nurses working in the field.

While the JPAHN considered the above-stated issues, it was asked about the feasibility of holding the 6th GNPHN in Japan. The following proposal was made at the meeting of the board of directors of JPAHN: to invite the 6th GNPHN to Japan to be jointly held with the 10th Annual Conference of JAPHN (hereinafter referred to as the 10th JAPHN); and to ask a public health nurse working in actual clinical settings to function as a president of the 10th JAPHN and ask an educational researcher at a university to be a president of the 6th GNPHN.

At the meeting of the board of directors of JAPHN held in January 2017 when the 7th JAPHN was held in Yamaguchi, the invitation of the 6th GNPHN was discussed. A lot of concerns were expressed, e.g., “I have difficulties because I do not understand English” or “I cannot deal with participants from abroad because I do not speak English.” When looking back 2015 in which the international committee of JAPHN started to distribute email newsletters to the members under the

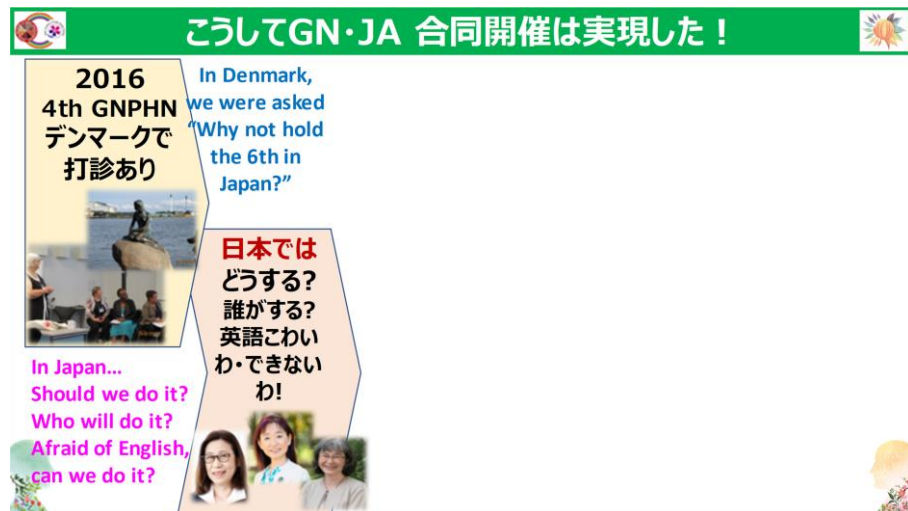


title of “PHN World,” there was a resistance against this title saying that “no one can open the newsletter with the English title.” Therefore, there was an increasing need for the JAPHN to take initiative in evoking revolutionary changes among public health nurses for the purpose of responding well to the wave of globalization.

After the discussion at the meeting of the board of directors of JPAHN, it was decided to nominate Ms. Tamami Matsumoto, Associate Director of Public Health, Osaka City Government to a president of the 10th JAPHN and Professor Reiko Okamoto at Osaka University to a president of the 6th GNPHN. This decision was approved at the 5th GNPHN held in Kenya.

Accordingly, the International Conference of GNPHN was to be held first in the Asia/Pacific region, that is, to be held in Osaka, Japan.

Since the “EXPO2025 Osaka, Kansai, Japan” will be held soon, this joint conference was expected to raise the awareness of the EXPO.



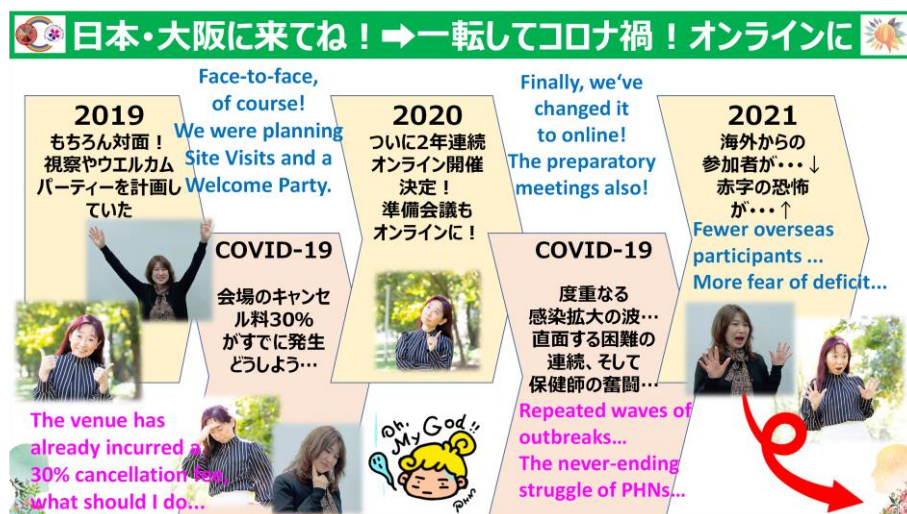
#### 4) Preparation of the joint conference

##### (1) 2019 to 2020

Needless to say, the conference was initially planned to be held in person. Although the JAPHN usually conducts a 2-day annual conference, the joint conference was supposed to be held for 3 days during which a variety of plans were considered as follows: 3 types of field tours in which participants from abroad would deepen their understanding about the actual situation in Japan of (1) maternal and child health, (2) adult health care, and (3) healthcare for the elderly by visiting public health departments in municipalities, healthcare centers, and other relevant facilities; and a welcome party. However, starting in the beginning of 2020, the waves of Covid-19 Pandemic attacked Japan many times.

At the multiple meetings of the planning committee of the joint conference and those of the JAPHN's board of directors, what was the best way for holding the joint conference was discussed, including a feasibility of conducting a hybrid conference which combines in-person with online sessions.

At last, it was decided to hold the joint conference completely





virtually. This was a painful financial decision because we had to pay a cancellation charge, i.e., 30% (1.28 million Japanese Yen), to cancel the hall.

## **(2) 2021 to 2022**

The planning committee consisted of 5 subcommittees: (1) Subcommittee for Execution: Core members of Osaka City Government and Osaka University; (2) Subcommittee for Liaison and PR; (3) Subcommittee for Registration and Review of Presentations; (4) Subcommittee for Program and Proceedings; and (5) Subcommittee for Ceremonies and Unique Novelty Items. The planning committee was composed of 24 members in total: 12 members were public health nurses (working in Osaka Prefecture, Osaka City, and Sakai City); and the remaining 12 were educational researchers at universities and colleges (Osaka University, Kyoto University, Kobe City College of Nursing, Osaka Medical College, and Konan Women's University).

During the preparation period, the planning committee held the 1<sup>st</sup> meeting on July 4, 2019, the 2<sup>nd</sup> meeting on November 19, 2019, and the 3<sup>rd</sup> meeting on June 30, 2020. These meetings were held in person in a conference room of Osaka City Government and all the members participated in these meetings. Subsequently, due to the impact of COVID-19, the 4<sup>th</sup> meeting was virtually held on November 11, 2020 and the 5<sup>th</sup> meeting, virtually on February 3, 2021. The subcommittees conducted their own meetings individually as follows: (1) Subcommittee for Execution held online 28 meetings on every Wednesday at night; (2) Subcommittee for Liaison and PR held a total of 4 meetings with 3 online and 1 in person; (3) Subcommittee for Registration and Review of Presentations held a total of 9 meetings with 8 online and 1 in person; (4) Subcommittee for Program and Proceedings held a total of 12 meetings with 11 online and 1 in person; and (5) Subcommittee for Ceremonies and Unique Novelty Items held a total of 7 meetings with 5 online and 2 in person.

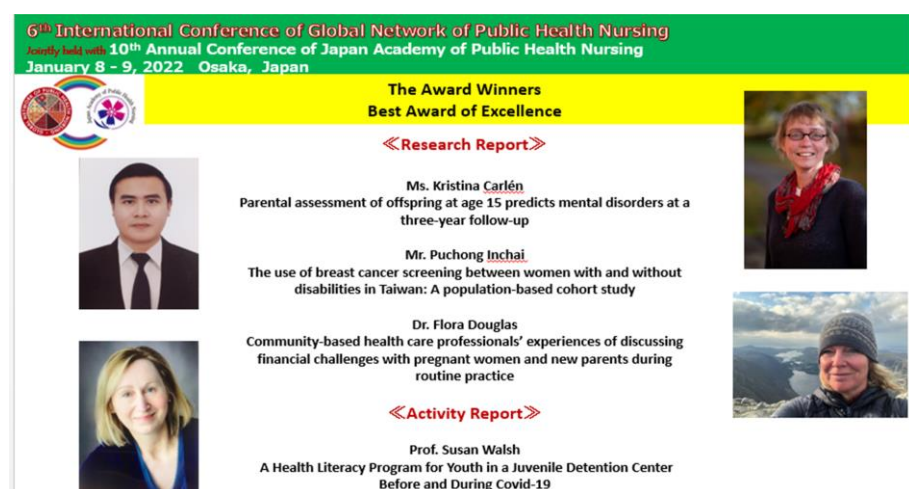

### 4) Review by the staff after the conference: Points they thought about and points to be improved upon in the future

[Points the staff thought about]

- Main programs as a whole (both on-demand and live streaming)
  - In some cases, Japanese subtitles were made available for video-recorded presentations in English and English subtitles, for those in Japanese. In other cases, both Japanese and English versions were prepared.
  - The staff asked presenters to allow downloading their data or materials as much as possible.
  - The staff made the best use of spare time between lectures, e.g., by posting advertisement movies or the relevant notifications.
  - The staff prepared the ZOOM virtual backgrounds for lecturers and participants.
  - The staff prepared emergency contacts (i.e., 3 telephone lines in total) dedicated to the lecturers and chairpersons as well as dedicated to participants for live streaming on the days of the conference.

■ Main programs live streamed

- In all main programs for the 2-day conference period except the lectures given by the two Presidents and the keynote speeches, the staff set Q&A sessions when they were live streamed so that opinion exchange was possible.
- Even for the programs live streamed, the staff prepared 2 channels for video streaming services so that as many participants as possible could view them.
- During the 2-day conference period, the staff arranged 2 rooms and made one room of them dedicated to live streaming so that the programs were live streamed in a quiet environment.
- The staff asked the vendor to secure the equipment that provided sufficiently fast transmission speed on the internet.

■ Presentations

- Chairpersons were nominated for individual categories of presentations so that the speaker was able to exchange opinions with the audience.
- In addition to PowerPoint presentations, video-recorded oral presentations were also accepted so that first authors were able to present their papers. (This decision was useful especially for graduate students who first experienced or wanted to accumulate experience in giving oral presentations at international conferences.)
- In order to meet the needs of participants, 3 types of presentations were made accepted as follows: (1) oral presentation (PowerPoint data plus video-recorded presentation); (2) paper or poster presentation (PDF file of PowerPoint presentation); and (3) presentation on the proceedings.

■ Others

- Workshops were limited to the 2-day period of the conference and not held during the on-demand streaming period.
- An “Omotenashi” (which means the Japanese way of hosting and serving guests) program included the following: illustrations drawn by Japanese public health nurses were made available; LINE network for public nurses was established; highlight spots of Osaka were introduced; and a social gathering party spoken in both Japanese and English was held.

[Points to be improved in the future]

- The staff were not able to check in advance the Q&A functions for the main programs and presentations and therefore, could not have identified challenging issues until the days of online streaming.
- The staff did not have effective communications with the vendor and the online delivery subcontractor.
- The online site was set just before the streaming and therefore, it was difficult to check and modify the specifications.
